### Remember -

- 1. The path is not linear
- 2. Your journey with Parkinson's is unique
- 3. Take time to acknowledge and understand what Parkinson's means to you emotionally and physically
- 4. There will be losses and gains (socially, physically, emotionally)

Then you can begin to take control of your journey and gain the confidence you need to manage your condition.





## Learning Confidence

- People who have higher confidence in their ability to manage their condition have better long-term outcomes
- How?
  - They have better physician communication
  - They have better adherence to treatments and symptom management strategies
  - They adopt healthier habits

- Someone to say you are doing ok, "You've got this".






### Parkinson's Impacts Your Mood
