Adjustment Reaction

- Adjustment Reaction: the difficult emotions and major stressors that are difficult to cope with
- Chronic or recurrent stressors

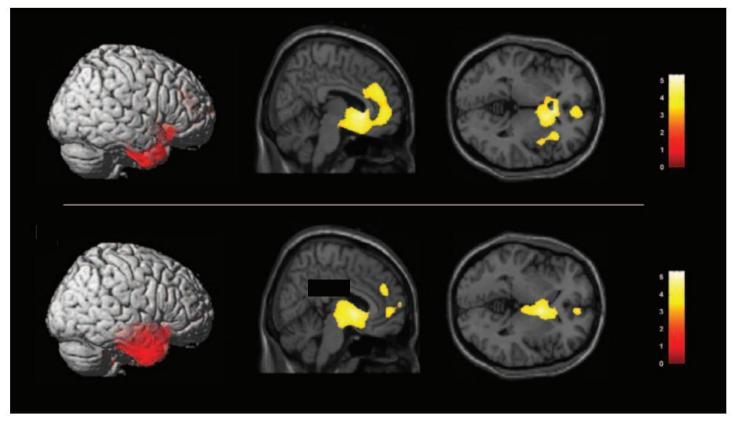

The Empathy Circuit

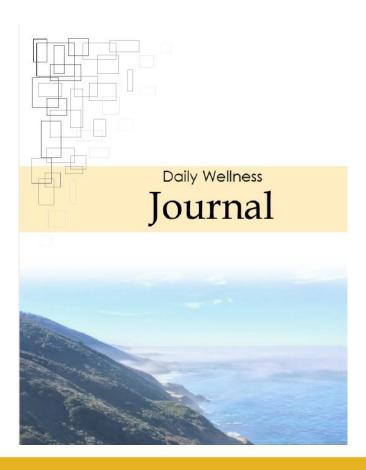

Resilience: SLEEP QUALITY

- 7-8 hours of sleep per night
- Limit fluid intake several hours before bedtime
- Take the TV out of the bedroom
- Have a calming ritual at bedtime (e.g. music)
- · Make sure you get enough bright sunlight in the morning
- Melatonin can often help sleep quality
- Ask your neurologist if you should be tested for Obstructive Sleep Apnea

Common in Parkinson's

45% are depressed 49% have an anxiety disorder

Significantly Under-recognized

not identified by neurologists in 50% of cases

Significantly Under-treated



Depression and Anxiety is <u>undertreated</u> in Parkinson's

Why is that so important?





• Mental health disorders have the greatest negative impact on quality of life and functional ability.

Action Steps

- Difficult Emotions during times of stress and loss are normal
