MEET DAVIS



Davis Phinney was fresh off of a successful professional cycling career, where he won an Olympic bronze medal in 1984 and was part of the first American team to race in the Tour de France, when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's. He founded the Davis Phinney Foundation in 2004 with the pioneering vision of helping those living with Parkinson's to take action to improve their quality of life through education, inspiration, resources, and effective self-care.

Davis' perseverance, coupled with his infectious positive attitude and dedication, inspires the work of the Davis Phinney Foundation and has earned him the reputation as a tireless advocate and mentor for others living with Parkinson's. In spring 2015, he was honored at the White House as a Champion of Change because of his work in the Parkinson's community.

GET MOVING WITH US TODAY!

You'll see this symbol on your agenda a couple of times. This represents two movement breaks we will take today. During this time, get ready to move your body, activate your mind, and try something new.

Movement Break 1: Dance Beyond Parkinson's

Dance has been known to enhance strength, coordination, flexibility, and balance. In Dance Beyond Parkinson's, we will stretch, groove, dance, be funky, kick up our heels, shout, relax, and feel good all over. Care partners and family members are always welcome! No dance experience required.

Movement Break 2: Goodemote Physical Therapy

The movement break will consist of a "Dynamic Mobility" sequence. It will include movements we use to "wake up" the joints, muscles, and nervous system and can be used as a movement prep warm-up or to help improve balance and gait.

Movement, mindfulness, and gratitude help her navigate the challenges of living with Parkinson's. She is a retired nurse-midwife and delivered over 800 babies in her career. Now in her second act, she's an author and advocate for finding wellness after a Parkinson's diagnosis.



DAVID LEVENTHAL

David Leventhal is a founding teacher and Program Director for Dance for PD®, a program of the Mark Morris Dance Group that has now been used as a model for classes in more than 300 communities in 25 countries. He leads classes for people with Parkinson's around the world and trains other teachers in the Dance for PD® approach. He has co-produced three volumes of a successful At Home DVD series for the program and has been instrumental in initiating and designing innovative projects involving live streaming and Moving Through Glass, a dance-based Google Glass App for people with Parkinson's. He received the 2016 World Parkinson Congress Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Parkinson's Community and was a co-recipient of the 2013 Alan Bonander Humanitarian Award from the Parkinson's Unity Walk. He is a sought-after speaker at international conferences and symposiums, and has spoken about the intersection of dance, Parkinson's, and health at many prestigious universities, conferences, and cultural centers. Leventhal designed and currently teaches a pioneering dance-based elective course that is part of the Narrative Medicine curriculum at Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons. He graduated from Brown University with honors in English Literature



GREG PONTONE, MD, MHS

Gregory Pontone, MD, MHS, is an Associate Professor in the Departments of Psychiatry and Neurology at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in Baltimore, Maryland. He is an Attending Psychiatrist in the Geriatric and Neuropsychiatry division and is the Director of the Johns Hopkins Parkinson's Disease Neuropsychiatry Clinic, which focuses on diagnosing and treating the neuropsychiatric aspects of Parkinson's and related disorders. Dr. Pontone's research focuses on the interaction between neuropsychiatric symptoms such as cognitive impairment, anxiety and depression, and motor impairment in Parkinson's. After completing a medicine internship and residency training in psychiatry at Johns Hopkins, Dr. Pontone completed a two-year fellowship in geriatric psychiatry and movement disorders focusing on Parkinson's through the Clinical Research Program of the Morris K. Udall Parkinson's Disease Research Center at Johns Hopkins. He also completed a fellowship in Clinical Trial Methods in Neurology sponsored by the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke. Dr. Pontone also serves on the Scientific Review Committee and as the chair of the Cognitive/ Psychiatric Working Group for an international consortium of Parkinson's disease researchers, the Parkinson Study Group.



RACHELLE SMITH STALLMAN, MS BCDMT, LCAT

Rachelle received her bachelor's degree in Dance from the University of New Mexico and her master's in Dance Therapy from Hunter College. She has advanced training with the Mark Morris Dance Group Dance for PD® program, and for the last three years has been teaching Dance Beyond Parkinson's classes in Albany and Saratoga.



CHRISTOPHER TAROLLI, MD

Dr. Tarolli graduated from Syracuse University in 2007 and received his MD from SUNY Downstate College of Medicine in 2012. He completed his internship in internal medicine and residency in neurology at the University of Rochester Medical Center and graduated in 2016. Dr. Tarolli completed a fellowship in movement disorders and experimental therapeutics of neurological disease in 2018. He joined the faculty in 2018 and specializes in the care of individuals with Parkinson's, atypical parkinsonian syndromes, and Huntington disease.

Beyond clinical work, Dr. Tarolli is a neurological educator and is the Co-director of the Mind, Brain, and Behavior neuroscience course at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. He is also involved in clinical research focusing on novel technologies, practice-based research, and palliative care in individuals with Parkinson and other movement disorders.







Cognition and Mood and How to Manage Them

- Reduce distractions
- O Focus on one task at a time
- O Talk to your doctor about depression
- Exercise
- O Get quality sleep
- O Eat a healthy diet
- O Do cognitive training/rehabilitation
- O Increase social interaction

How to Live Well with Parkinson's

- O Commit to exercise go for a walk, find a class, join a gym, get a treadmill
- O Update a medication list and keep it in your wallet/ purse
- O Connect with your Parkinson's community
- Recognize at least one non-motor symptom to discuss with your physician

Not Just the Shakes: Non-motor Symptoms of Parkinson's

- O Non-motor symptoms are common, accumulate with progression, and have a major impact on quality of life
- O Pain is common in Parkinson's. Activity can help manage it
- O Some simple lifestyle interventions can help to manage bothersome drops in blood pressure
- O Be aware of common non-motor symptoms and highlight YOUR priorities at your next doctor's appointment

The Mind of a Dancer

- O Make training fun: infuse it with imagination, creativity, and novelty
- O Use music as your guide, partner, and coach
- O Plan everyday movement as a choreographer does
- O Harness the power of imagery—and focus on how we move
- O Utilize social connections to move and to stay motivated
