MEET DAVIS



Davis Phinney was fresh off a successful professional cycling career—where he won an Olympic bronze medal in 1984 and was part of the first American team to race in the Tour de France—when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's. He founded the Davis Phinney Foundation in 2004 with the pioneering vision of helping those living with Parkinson's take action to improve their quality of life through education, inspiration, resources, and effective self-care.

Davis's perseverance, coupled with his infectious positive attitude and dedication, inspire the work of the Davis Phinney Foundation and have earned him the reputation as a tireless advocate and mentor for others living with Parkinson's. Because of his work in the Parkinson's community, in spring of 2015, he was honored at the White House as a Champion of Change.

BENJAMIN (BJ) BEMENT, diagnosed in 2013 at age 44, is a co-director of CAPAC. He is also the Chairman of the Moving Day Team and Art Gala Team. He is a willing participant of any activity that brings persons with Parkinson's and care partners together. He serves on the Parkinson's Foundation's Advisory Council and is an Advisory Council member of the Young Onset Parkinson's Network (YOPN). He also serves as part of the community outreach for the Quiver.org.



SUSAN BENSINGER earned a Bachelor of Arts in dance education from Pennsylvania State University and a Master of Arts in dance from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. While there, she performed with the Maida Withers Dance Construction Company. She taught dance at George Washington University, Foxcroft School, and Willow Charter School. In 2007, she was voted Teacher of the Year at Willow. Bensinger began working with NOBA in 2012 and is a trained substitute for NOBA's Oscar J. Tolmas Charitable Trust Dance for Parkinson's Program.



SARAH BREAUX, MD is a movement disorders neurologist at Ochsner Health in New Orleans and Raceland, Louisiana. She earned her medical degree from Louisiana State University Health Science Center in New Orleans. Dr. Breaux completed her internship and residency in neurology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) where she was chief resident. She completed a fellowship in movement disorders at UAB before returning home to Louisiana to practice in her hometown in the bayou region and New Orleans. She has special interest in deep brain stimulation for essential tremor and Parkinson's disease. Her passion is education and empowering patients with Parkinson's to take ownership of their life while navigating each step with resilience, determination, and steadfast spirit.



ROBERT COCHRANE, PHD is a graduate of UNLV's interdisciplinary health sciences program. His father, Dan, was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2001, which shifted Robert's artistic lens to health. He continues to test and research the effects of improvisation and storytelling on Parkinson's. Robert has received grants from the Parkinson's Foundation and support from the Davis Phinney Foundation. Via his nonprofit, Yes, And...eXercise! (www.yesandexercise.org), Robert offers joy, optimism, and practical tools for all people in the Parkinson's community to thrive today. He lives with his beautiful wife, two teenagers, and a rambunctious puppy named Stella (though it's usually pronounced, "STELLAAAAA!") in Walnut Creek, CA. Robert is a proud care partner for his amazing parents.



POLLY DAWKINS brings 25 years of for-profit and nonprofit experience to her position as the Executive Director of the Davis Phinney Foundation. She is committed to making wise use of the Foundation's resources, enabling it to extend its reach while staying true to its mission. Polly is passionate about helping people with Parkinson's thrive by providing education, connection to community, and funding quality-of-life research that takes the guesswork out of living well.



APRIL DAYOK earned a Bachelor of Arts in dance from Point Park University. After relocating to New York, she danced with Becky Radway Dance Project, Counter Tides Dance, Mark Dendy Dance and Theater Projects, and worked with the Mark Morris Dance Group's Dance for PD® program and for Pamela Quinn (dancer, Parkinson's patient, and movement specialist for Parkinson's patients). Dayok has nationally and internationally toured with Lightwire Theater and locally performed with Mélange Dance Company and ELLEvate Dance. She began working with NOBA in 2017 and is an instructor for NOBA's Oscar J. Tolmas Charitable Trust Dance for Parkinson's Program.



ANNA GRILL was a healthy, active working mom of two daughters living her best life when seemingly out of the blue, a slight tremor in her left pinky resulted in a young onset Parkinson's diagnosis at age 38. She started the Young Onset Parkinson's Network (YOPN), a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, in 2020. It has grown to a community of over 1,100 members located in all 50 states and in 38 countries. YOPN provides free membership to all diagnosed with YOPD and their friends and family. Member benefits include virtual programming and networking sessions along with access to a robust member portal that provides valuable resources and access to services.



MADELEINE E. HACKNEY, PHD holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Dance Performance from New York University, Tisch School of the Arts, and a Ph.D. in Movement Science from Washington University in St. Louis. She is a tenured Associate Professor of Medicine in the Emory University School of Medicine, Department of Medicine, Division of Geriatrics and Gerontology; a Research Health Scientist at the Atlanta VA Center for Visual and Neurocognitive Rehabilitation; and an Investigator with the Birmingham/Atlanta VA Geriatric Research Education and Clinical Center. She has received funding from the Department of Veterans Affairs, the NIH, the NSF, the Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute, the Parkinson Foundation and the CDC. She frequently reviews grant applications for the VA and the NIH, and recently for the National Endowment for the Arts. Her research has received media coverage in the New York Times, Scientific American, the Atlanta Journal Constitution, National Public Radio, and in Musicophilia. She has authored more than 90 peer-reviewed articles.



AARON HAUG, MD is a neurologist and movement disorders specialist at HealthONE Neurology Specialists in Denver, Colorado. He completed neurology residency and a movement disorders fellowship at the University of Colorado, including a year as chief resident. In his clinical practice, Dr. Haug focuses on Parkinson's disease, tremor, and other movement disorders, with expertise in both medical management and deep brain stimulation for the treatment of these conditions. Outside the office, he likes to spend time with his family, play ultimate frisbee, and follow Colorado Rockies baseball.



BENZI KLUGER, MD, MS is a Professor of Neurology and Medicine and the Director of the Palliative Care Research Center at the University of Rochester Medical Center (New York). He is an internationally recognized leader in the emerging field of neuropalliative care and the founding President of the International Neuropalliative Care Society (www.inpcs.org), an organization dedicated to improving models of care for persons living with neurologic illness and their families. Dr. Kluger's research focuses on developing, testing and implementing palliative care interventions for persons living with Parkinson's and other neurologic illnesses, and in improving understanding and treatment of nonmotor symptoms in Parkinson's, including fatigue and cognitive dysfunction. He is working on several writing projects (www.benzikluger.com) related to empowering people living with serious illness to better advocate for themselves and to avoid potentially dangerous and expensive medical BS.



BRIAN COPELAND, MD works in New Orleans, LA, as a neurology specialist and has 19 years' experience. Dr. Copeland is board certified in neurology and graduated from University of South Carolina School of Medicine Columbia in 2005. He completed a residency at Tulane University School of Medicine. When he's not helping patients, he likes to try local cuisine.



SARAH PEREZ, MD is a movement disorder neurologist at the Southeast Louisiana Veterans Health Care System Medical Center in New Orleans. Dr. Perez is originally from Port Vincent, Louisiana. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in music performance majoring in clarinet at Louisiana State University, where she was a member of the LSU Wind Ensemble and The Golden Band from Tigerland. She graduated LSU summa cum laude and pursued a career as a professional musician while working as an optician at Sam's Club Optical. Her passion for helping people inspired her to pursue medicine.
