MEET DAVIS



Davis Phinney was fresh off of a successful professional cycling career, where he won an Olympic bronze medal in 1984 and was part of the first American team to race in the Tour de France, when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's. He founded the Davis Phinney Foundation in 2004 with the pioneering vision of helping those living with Parkinson's to take action to improve their quality of life through education, inspiration, resources and effective self-care.

Davis' perseverance, coupled with his infectious positive attitude and dedication, inspire the work of the Davis Phinney Foundation and have earned him the reputation as a tireless advocate and mentor for others living with Parkinson's. In spring of 2015, he was honored at the White House as a Champion of Change because of his work in the Parkinson's community.

GET MOVING WITH US TODAY!

You'll see this symbol on your agenda a few times. This represents three movement breaks we will take today. During this time, get ready to move your body, activate your mind and maybe try something new.

Movement Break #1: CLIMB Exercise Program

The CLIMB session will be focusing on posture alignment and appropriate muscle activation. This creates improved muscular balance and functional ability, while reducing pain. As a result of engaging in regular CLIMB sessions, you can experience enhanced movement in your activities of daily living.

Movement Break #2: Rock Steady Boxing

Rock Steady Boxing empowers and enables people with Parkinson's to fight their disease by providing non-contact, boxing-style fitness programs that improve their quality of life, sense of self-efficacy and self-worth.

Movement Break #3: Voice Activation

Join expert Fannie Linder and learn useful vocal strengthening exercises to do at home. Activities will focus on improving voice quality, volume and articulation with multiple types of voice activation drills. Re-train your brain with LSVT neuroplasticity techniques, vocal aerobics and choral singing exercises. Increase loudness and confidence with these fun vocal exercises.

Women with Parkinson's

More men than women are diagnosed with Parkinson's by a ratio of nearly 2:1. But the rate of diagnosis is not the only difference. Women and men diagnosed with Parkinson's experience differences when it comes to presenting symptoms, sleep problems, cognitive impact, responses to surgery, medication side effects, emotional health, the care partner experience and more. In this session, a panel of speakers will address the unique issues women face and share strategies for advocating for your care, communicating with your medical and care team, goal setting and finding a community of women to support you on your path of living well with Parkinson's today.

This session will include a discussion of: Types of complementary therapies and their evaluated safety, evidence supporting complementary therapies and symptom relief potential.

The role of a care partner is ever-evolving. Learn about navigating the world of the care partner in a positive way through strength and self-care. Care partners, spouses and family members are all encouraged to attend this session. Discussion will include: the importance of self-care, significance of social engagement, strategies for navigating this role, practical tips for taking care of your own well-being, effective ways to communicate with your person with Parkinson's and when and how to ask for help.

POLLY DAWKINS

Polly brings 25 years of for-profit and nonprofit experience to her position as the Executive Director of the Davis Phinney Foundation. She is committed to making wise use of the Foundation's resources, enabling it to extend its reach while staying true to its mission. Polly is passionate about helping people with Parkinson's thrive by providing education, connection to community and funding quality of life research that takes the guesswork out of living well.



ROSEANNE DOBKIN, PHD

Dr. Roseanne D. Dobkin completed her PhD in clinical psychology at the Medical College of Pennsylvania-Hahnemann University (2002) and a postdoctoral fellowship in clinical psychopharmacology at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School (2003). She has been conducting mental health research in Parkinson's for the past 13 years. To date, her research has addressed the efficacy of face-to-face cognitive-behavioral treatment (CBT) for depression in Parkinson's (dPD) in a randomized controlled trial, and the development and pilot-testing of telephone-based CBT interventions for dPD. She has systematically examined barriers to mental health care utilization in PD and the use of telemedicine to leverage access to specialized mental health care in the Parkinson's community.



MEGAN FEENY

Megan Feeney, MPH is Senior Manager of Community Engagement at the Parkinson's Foundation. In this role, she manages several national patient leadership programs that engage the community in addressing critical unmet needs in Parkinson's. She manages the Women and PD Initiative, an innovative program that addresses long-standing gender disparities in Parkinson's. Within the Women and PD Initiative, her team received a \$250,000 Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI) Engagement Award titled, Women and PD Teams to Advance Learning and Knowledge (Women and PD TALK).



KRISTY FOLLMAR

Kristy Rose Follmar is one of the founders of Rock Steady Boxing (RBS), a program dedicated to empowering people with Parkinson's have a better quality of life through a non-contact boxing-based fitness program. Follmar has a BA in Telecommunications and Marketing and is a Certified Personal Trainer and Exercise is Medicine Specialist through the American College of Sports Medicine. Currently, RBS has over 800 affiliate locations throughout the world dedicated to The Fight Against Parkinson's.



SARA GARVEY, PHD

Sara Garvey is the Research Program Manager for the Davis Phinney Foundation. Her research career has centered around promoting well-being and helping people live their best lives possible. Sara holds a PhD in Applied Social and Health Psychology from Colorado State University and has directed numerous research projects with individuals, schools and community organizations. In her role at the Davis Phinney Foundation, Sara works to be the voice and face of the Foundation on research topics. While staying up-to-date on the latest developments in Parkinson's research, she also manages the research activities of the Foundation.



TRAVIS GAWLER, PT, DPT

Dr. Gawler is the lead Neurologic Physical Therapist at Palmetto Health Physical and Specialty Therapy in Columbia, SC. He specializes in the treatment of individuals with Parkinson's and is most interested in fall prevention and the utilization of exercise in maximizing mobility and minimizing functional decline. Dr. Gawler is a graduate of the University of South Carolina, where he received his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 2008 and his doctorate in physical therapy in 2011. In 2014, Dr. Gawler launched a community-based group exercise program for individuals with Parkinson's with the Greenville Health System and a similar program in 2016 with the YMCA in Columbia, SC. He is a PWR! Therapist, LSVT BIG certified and Board Certified Clinical Specialist in Neurologic Physical Therapy. He teaches and speaks regionally on fall prevention, the importance and utilization of exercises across the Parkinson's spectrum and current concepts for the treatment of individuals with Parkinson's. Dr Gawler is also on the Science Advisory Board for the Davis Phinney Foundation.



LINDA HINKLE

Linda Hinkle is Co-Chairman of programs for the Parkinson's Awareness Association of Central Indiana (PAACI). Linda lives in Noblesville, IN. She is married, has two grown children, and is a Grandmother to five beautiful grandchildren ages 8-17. She was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2001. After living in denial for over 4 years, she joined Rock Steady Boxing in 2006. In 2008, she helped to start Positive Directions support group. She received her BS degree from Ball State University in Speech and Hearing Therapy. She saw a need for more women who are mothers, daughters, wives, care givers, all with Parkinson's to join together to help and support each other, so she organized three different, three day retreats in 2010, 2011, and 2013. Linda stays active by attending the Climb exercise classes, playing bridge, Mahjong, quilting and of course spending time with friends and family.



SUSAN IMKE, FNP, GNP-C

Susan Imke is an advanced nurse practitioner holding dual certifications in family health care and gerontology by the American Nurses Credentialing Center. She earned her masters of science in community health education from The University of North Texas in 1983 and serves as an educational consultant to the National Parkinson Foundation, The Parkinson Alliance and the Society for Supranuclear Palsy. Mrs. Imke has authored numerous publications for families living with Parkinson's and lectures widely to healthcare professionals as well as caregivers on topics related to the neurology of aging and living with chronic illness. Mrs. Imke also maintains a geriatric case management practice in Ft. Worth, TX.



JOOHI JIMINEZ-SHAHED, MD

Dr. Joohi Jimenez-Shahed, MD is an Associate Professor of Neurology at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) where she currently is the Director of the Deep Brain Stimulation program. After completing her undergraduate degree at Washington University in St. Louis, she received her medical degree from BCM and Neurology residency training at Duke University Medical Center. She then completed a fellowship in Movement Disorders at the Parkinson's Disease Center and Movement Disorders Clinic at BCM. She serves on the Science Advisory Board of the Davis Phinney Foundation and the Medical Advisory Board for the Tourette Association of America and chairs the Medical Advisory Board for the Houston Area Parkinson Society.



DEB KNAPP

Deb is the Clinical Education Supervisor for the Indiana Parkinson Foundation. Her credentials include: ACE and AFAA certified Personal Trainer, EGOSCUE, PWR and Functional Aging Specialist. Deb is a graduate of Anderson University with a BA in physical education.
