# MEET DAVIS



Davis Phinney was fresh off of a successful professional cycling career, where he won an Olympic bronze medal in 1984 and was part of the first American team to race in the Tour de France, when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's. He founded the Davis Phinney Foundation in 2004 with the pioneering vision of helping those living with Parkinson's to take action to improve their quality of life through education, inspiration, resources and effective self-care.

Davis' perseverance, coupled with his infectious positive attitude and dedication, inspire the work of the Davis Phinney Foundation and have earned him the reputation as a tireless advocate and mentor for others living with Parkinson's. In spring 2015, he was honored at the White House as a Champion of Change because of his work in the Parkinson's community.

## **POLLY DAWKINS**

Polly brings 25 years of for-profit and nonprofit experience to her position as the Executive Director of the Davis Phinney Foundation. She is committed to making wise use of the Foundation's resources, enabling it to extend its reach while staying true to its mission. ## **NENAD DUPLANCIC**

Nenad Duplancic started his career in 1980 as a ballet accompanist, in Belgrade, former Yugoslavia. In 1993 he joined The School of Dance artists and continues to inspire students with his original music.



## **SANDIE JONES**

Sandie Jones trained as a registered nurse specializing in psychiatry. In 1998, she joined Parkinson Canada and is now an integral part of the Information and Referral team. In this role, she has provided support, education, medical interventions, coping strategies, community services and other information about Parkinson's and its management, not only to people living with Parkinson's and their families but also to other professionals who work with them. This role has given her a comprehensive insight into the challenges people with Parkinson's and their care partners face.



## **SOANIA MATHUR, MD**

Dr. Soania Mathur is a former family physician turned speaker, writer, educator and Parkinson's advocate. She is also on the board of the Davis Phinney Foundation. Dr. Mathur was diagnosed with Parkinson's at the age of 27 and retired 12 years later. She speaks passionately about the challenges of adjusting physically and emotionally and the coping strategies available to people living with Parkinson's and their care partners. She lives just outside of Toronto, Ontario.



## **MARIA MARANO, MSC**

Maria Marano has a background in neuroscience with specific training in Parkinson's research. She began with Parkinson Canada working in community development and later joined the education and client services team where she works as an Information and Referral Associate. In this role, she provides education and support to people living with Parkinson's, their care partners and healthcare professionals. Maria's research experience has been an indispensable asset for translating new scientific findings to clients. Through her work, Maria strives to empower people affected by Parkinson's to better understand and manage their illnesses.



## **GREG PONTONE, MD, MHS**

Gregory Pontone is an Associate Professor in the Departments of Psychiatry and Neurology at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in Baltimore, Maryland. He is an Attending Psychiatrist in the Geriatric and Neuropsychiatry division where he treats patients with neurodegenerative disorders (including Parkinson's and related disorders, Alzheimer's dementia), and behavioral disturbances resulting from these diseases. Dr. Pontone is the director of the Johns Hopkins Parkinson's disease Neuropsychiatry Clinic, which focuses on diagnosing and treating the neuropsychiatric aspects of Parkinson's and related disorders. His research focuses on the interaction between neuropsychiatric symptoms such as cognitive impairment, anxiety and depression and motor impairment in Parkinson's.



## **KAITLYN ROLAND, PHD**

Kaitlyn Roland is an adjunct professor (School of Public Health and Social Policy) and researcher at the University of Victoria (Institute on Aging and Lifelong Health) and Office of the Seniors Advocate (Ministry of Health, Gov BC). Over the past 12 years, her research program has focused on physical function, cognitive function, caregiver well-being and supports in Parkinson's. She teaches yoga and delivers yoga education. She also publishes and presents on the benefits of yoga for Parkinson's. She was a founding Board Member and is the current Scientific Advisor for the Parkinson Wellness Project, a community space offering fun, safe and rigorous evidence-based multidisciplinary exercise programs designed to empower, improve function and increase quality of life for those living with Parkinson's on Vancouver Island, BC.



## **CHRISTINE SEABY, RMT, RHN**

Christine Seaby is the founder and owner of Boxing 4 Health Inc. In the past three years, Boxing 4 Health has quickly grown to three locations with two in Ottawa and one in Smiths Falls. They teach fitness-inspired boxing classes to people with Parkinson's and seniors. They also offer latin, PWR! and yoga classes. They have an awesome group of students and an amazing group of instructors and volunteers who inspire their students to keep on fighting and have fun doing it!



## **EVAN SIDDALL, JD**

Evan is President and CEO of Canada Mortgage & Housing Corp, Canada's housing agency. He has degrees in law and management economics and has served on several corporate and charitable boards. An active cyclist, Evan was introduced to the Davis Phinney Foundation after he was diagnosed with Parkinson's in early 2015. Immediately taken by the mission to "live well today," Evan and a group of close friends founded the Growling Beaver Brevet to benefit the Davis Phinney Foundation. In five years, the GBB has become a core supporter of the Foundation and helped us expand our work to help Canadians living with Parkinson's. Recently, the GBB expanded its efforts to benefit Brain Canada Foundation's integrated approach to brain research, addressing the range of neurological disorders, mental illnesses and addictions and brain and spinal cord injuries.



## **MARIA SHEPERTYCKI, PTA**

Maria Shepertycki is a teacher and choreographer with The School of Dance and a Physiotherapy Assistant (PTA) for a select number of private physiotherapy practices in Ottawa. As a PTA, Maria provides treatment activities specifically for people with Parkinson's under the direction of LSVT Big! and PWR! clinicians.



## **ANGELA SUPINO, MA**

Angela Supino has trained as a counselor and therapist with a concentration on individual counseling. She has worked with Parkinson Canada in the Ottawa office for 10 years as a part-time counselor. In her role, Angela guides those who are experiencing difficult situations to reach solutions and to manage the emotional and psychological impact of living with Parkinson's. Additionally, she is a Parkinson's and care partner support group facilitator which has helped her understand the demands of Parkinson's, people's resiliency and coping strategies in the face of these demands and the opportunities available to help them have an empowered and fulfilling quality of life.



## **CHRISTOPHER TAROLLI, MD**

Dr. Tarolli graduated from Syracuse University in 2003 and received his MD from SUNY Downstate College of Medicine in 2012. He completed his internship in internal medicine and residency in neurology at the University of Rochester Medical Center and graduated in 2016. Dr. Tarolli completed a fellowship in movement disorders and experimental therapeutics of neurological disease in 2018. He joined the faculty in 2018 and specializes in the care of individuals with Parkinson's, atypical parkinsonian syndromes and Huntington's disease. Beyond clinical work, Dr. Tarolli is a neurological educator and is the Associate Director of the Mind, Brain, Behavior neuroscience course at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. He is also involved in clinical research focused on novel technologies, practice-based research and palliative care in individuals with Parkinson's and other movement disorders.



## **CHRIS WEISSBACH, CEP, NCCP**

Chris Weissbach is a former competitive and champion amateur boxer. He is the Founder and Head Coach of Phoenix Boxing and an Exercise Physiologist with the Canadian Society of Exercise Physiology. He has been coaching and teaching boxing training for health, fitness and sport performance for over 20 years. In 2016, he created and began Phoenix Boxing's unique Knock-Out Parkinson's program for those diagnosed with Parkinson's and has been featured on CBC Television and Radio.

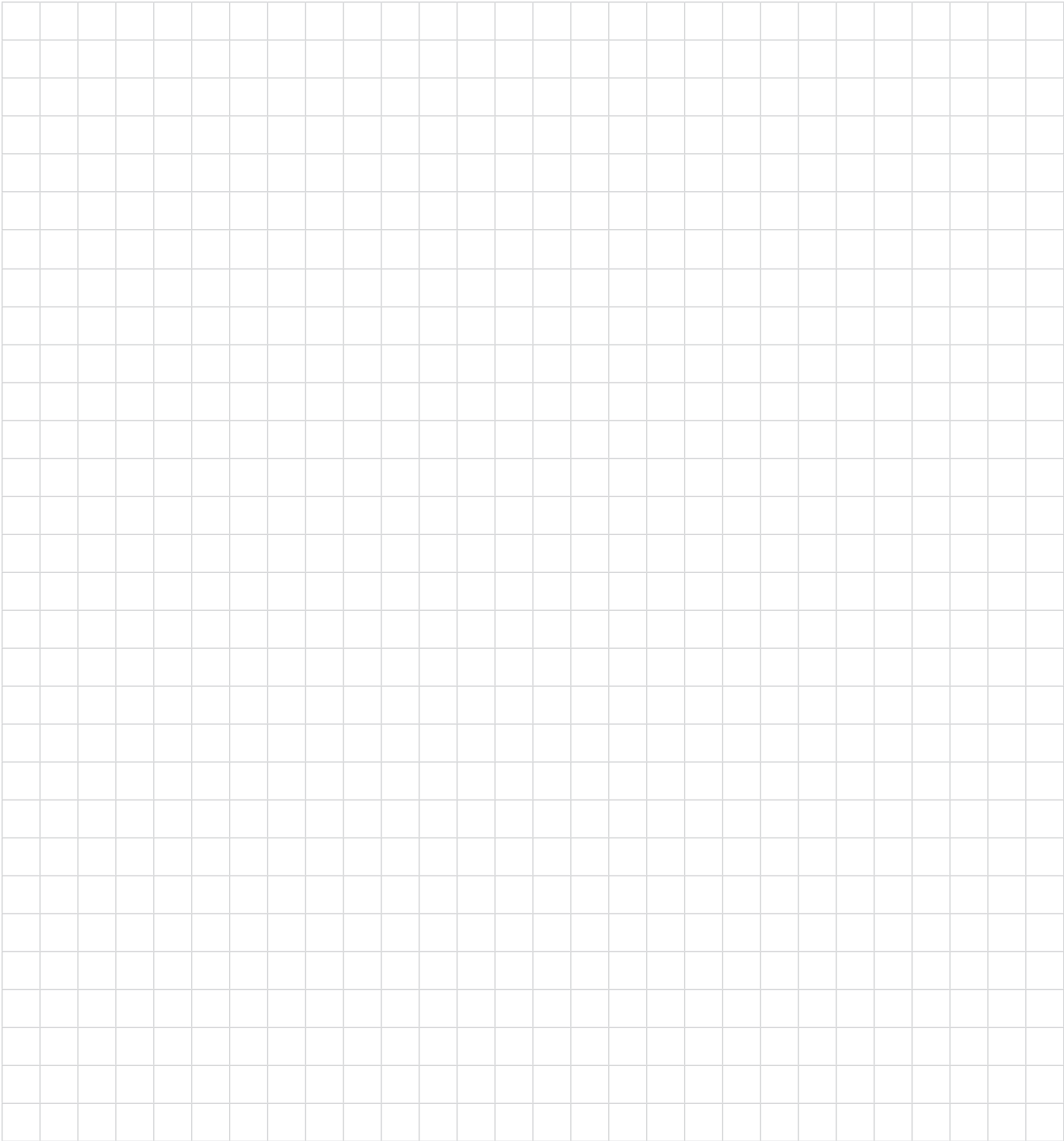


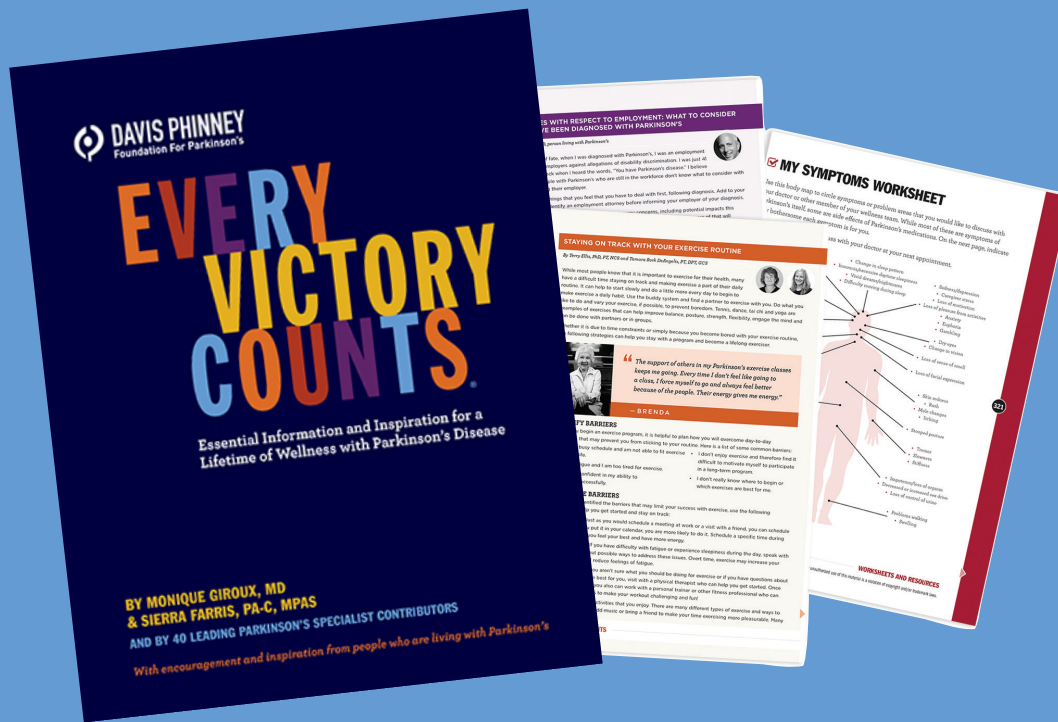

## ACTION STEPS

### **Celebrating Moments of Victory**

- Strengthen ties to your community and tap into local resources to help you reach your goals
- Find your inner-strength; pledge to make tomorrow better than today
- Commit to some form of exercise; a little is better than none
- Look for examples of people who can serve as role models and let their successes provide you with hope and optimism

### **Not Just the Shakes: Non-motor Symptoms**

- Commit to exercise – go for a walk, find a class, join a gym, get a treadmill
- Update a medication list to keep in your wallet/purse
- Connect with your Parkinson's community
- Recognize at least one non-motor symptom to discuss with your physician

### **Cognitive Challenges & What to Do About Them**

- Ask to be screened for cognitive abilities routinely
- Grow your healthy coping toolbox
- Engage in cognitive exercise
- Engage in physical exercise as tolerated

## How to Exercise Safely and Consistently While Living with Parkinson's

- Use exercise to help you move better throughout the day
- Challenge your body and your brain on a daily basis
- Use exercise and activity as a way to build a relationship with yourself (Check in! Connect! Pay attention!)

## Living Well

- Identify two strategies to improve your key relationships
- Choose at least one nutritional or activity change to improve your physical health or safety
- Give thanks
- Laugh more
