As a self-proclaimed amateur "PD satirist", he has been a speaker and patient advocate for several foundations and has been featured on national news programs and webcasts, speaking about living a high-impact life, thanks to traditional therapies and a "zen-aggressive lifestyle."



MARY SUE LANIGAN

Mary Sue Lanigan is the Chief Executive Officer of the Michigan Parkinson Foundation, an organization that provides direct patient services and education to people living with Parkinson's disease and their families. The Michigan Parkinson Foundation is headquartered in Bingham Farms and serves the entire state of Michigan. Mary Sue has been with the foundation for 3½ years. Prior to that, Mary Sue was the Development Director for the Arthritis Foundation, Great Lakes Region for fifteen years and before that she was a patient educator at the Cleveland Clinic and community education director at Diabetes Assn of Greater Cleveland. Mary Sue has 29 years of experience in program development for chronic disease management in both the non-profit and the private sector. Mary Sue has a Bachelor of Science degree in Community Health Education from Kent state University.



MEGHAN MALLEY, PT, DPT

Meghan Malley, PT, DPT is the Lead Physical Therapist and Medical Program Coordinator at The Recovery Project. She has specialized in the treatment of neurological diseases and disorders for the last 12 years, with a heavy focus in Parkinson's Disease. She is certified in LSVT, Parkinson's Wellness Recovery (PWR!) and Rock Steady Boxing. Meghan is a guest lecturer in the physical therapy program at Wayne State University, where she teaches about the physical therapy management of Parkinson's Disease.



MARK MAPSTONE, PHD

Mark Mapstone is Professor of Neurology at the University of California, Irvine School of Medicine. He is a member of the UCI Institute for Memory Impairments and Neurological Disorders and a Fellow of the UCI Center for Neurobiology of Learning and Memory. His research focuses on pre-clinical detection of neurological disease using cognitive tests and biomarkers obtained from blood. He has a special interest in developing strategies to maintain successful cognitive aging. In the clinic, he specializes in cognitive assessment of older adults with suspected brain disease. Dr. Mapstone earned a PhD in Clinical Psychology at Northwestern University and completed fellowship training in Neuropsychology and Experimental Therapeutics at the University of Rochester. He received a Career Development Award from the National Institute on Aging and his research has been funded by the National Institutes of Health, the Michael J. Fox Foundation, and the Department of Defense.



PATINA WARINNER, RD, LD

Patina Warinner is a Registered, Licensed Dietitian from Columbus, Ohio, with a Bachelor of Science in Dietetics from Miami University. She has been a clinical dietitian for 24 years and has worked with OhioHealth for the past 16 years. Through OhioHealth's "Delay the Disease" program, she presents nutrition education for individuals with Parkinson's and their care partners. This program provides valuable resources and tools encouraging individuals to maximize their health and independence. Patina also provides Parkinson's focused nutrition seminars for various agencies throughout the Central Ohio area. 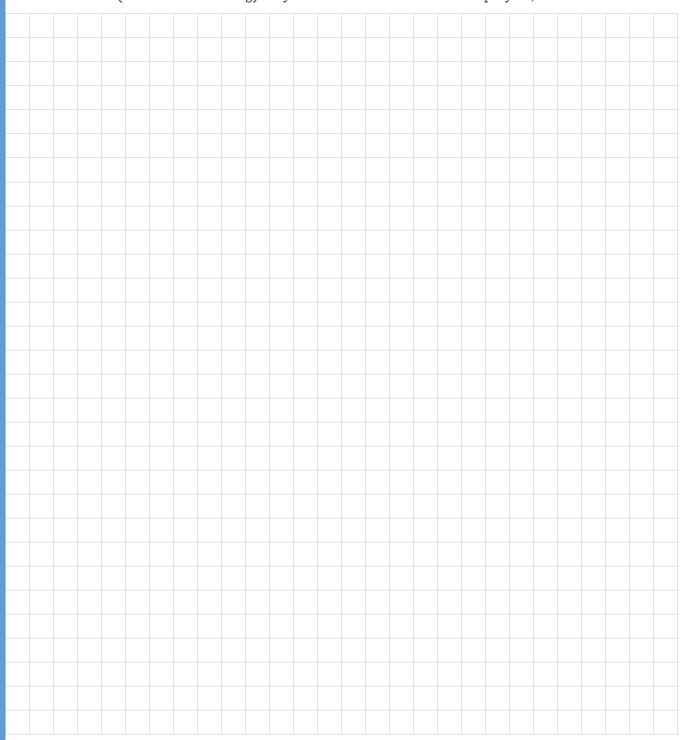

- Make exercise a habit part of your daily routine
- O Choose a type of exercise that best meets your needs, set measurable goals, and track your progress
- O Make an appointment with a Physical Therapist with expertise in Parkinson's
- O Be sure to build muscle strength by doing weight-bearing exercises several times a week

0	If you have non-motor symptoms, ask your doctor to evaluate them and report their impact on your quality of life
0	Recognize that care partner stress is related to the severity of non-motor symptoms
0	Most cognitive symptoms are related to the slowing of information processing, similar to motor symptoms
0	Keep your brain active with novelty, variety, and challenge
0	Focus on learning something new every day
0	Commit to remembering and use cues and strategies
