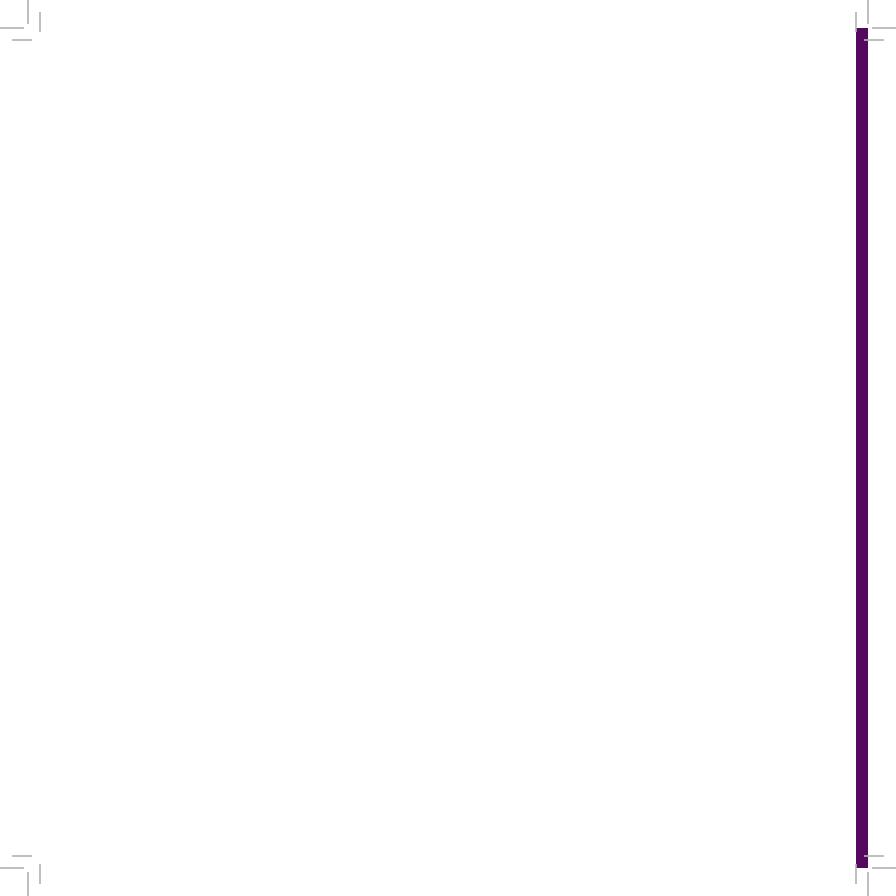

BAS BLOEM, MD, PHD

Professor Bas Bloem is a consultant neurologist at the Department of Neurology, Radboud University Medical Centre, Nijmegen, The Netherlands. He received his medical degree at Leiden University Medical Centre in 1993 and his PhD in 1994. Professor Bloem completed movement disorders fellowships at The Parkinson's Institute, Sunnyvale, California, and at the Institute of Neurology, Queen Square, London. His two main research areas are cerebral compensatory mechanisms, especially regarding gait and balance, and healthcare innovation, aiming to develop and scientifically evaluate patientcentered collaborative care. His work has recently focused on wearable sensors, machine learning, and artificial intelligence. His latest work also focuses on preventing Parkinson's, with emphasis on eradicating environmental toxins and using lifestyle interventions. Bloem also values the publication of remarkable observations in single patients.



MIKE BRAITSCH, PT, DPT

Michael Braitsch is a licensed Doctor of Physical Therapy, a former amateur fighter, former kinesiology professor, and an internationally certified fight referee. In addition to treating individuals, Braitsch runs group exercise programs steeped in leading evidence from physical therapy and exercise science to help people with chronic and progressive conditions move and feel better. He currently researches the effects of non-contact boxing training on impairments associated with Parkinson's and provides programs including SOUTH PAWS Parkinson boxing and Tai chi for balance. One of Dr. Mike's goals is to change how physical therapy is structured for people with chronic and progressive conditions, empowering people to better participate in community wellness. Dr. Mike founded Tribe Wellness, LLC, in 2017 to promote exercise to improve health, fight impairments, and increase quality of life.



POLLY CAPRIO

Polly Caprio is a fan favorite Power for Parkinson's Fitness Instructor on the Power for Parkinson's YouTube Channel and at local in-person classes in Austin, TX. Polly has worked as a health educator in the fitness industry for over 40 years. She has a Health and Safety Education/Community Health degree and is certified as a group fitness instructor with ACE. Polly created the Brain and Body class format at Power for Parkinson's and leads two classes weekly. Her favorite part of the job is witnessing the beautiful and wonderful improvements in the quality of life for people when they exercise.



DANIEL CORCOS, PHD

Daniel Corcos obtained his PhD (1982) in motor control from the University of Oregon after obtaining his master's degree in psychology in 1980. His primary research interests are aimed at helping people with Parkinson's improve their quality of life, improve their mobility and cognition, and slow down the rate at which Parkinson's progresses. Integrating neuroscience and expertise in conducting clinical trials, he focuses on interventions (such as resistance exercise and endurance exercise) that aim to reduce the symptoms and speed of Parkinson's progression. Within this context, Dr. Corcos uses exercise interventions and doses (frequency, intensity, time, and type) that can be precisely controlled to achieve these goals and develops and integrates laboratory-based interventions that people with Parkinson's can employ in their local community. His current research, published in JAMA Neurology, suggests that high-intensity endurance slows the rate at which Parkinson's progresses. These findings have been covered in the New York Times and the general press worldwide. Dr. Corcos lectures nationally and internationally to physicians, neuroscientists, and patients on the benefits of exercise for those with Parkinson's.



POLLY DAWKINS

Polly brings 25 years of for-profit and nonprofit experience to the Davis Phinney Foundation. That experience includes 13 years leading business-to-business, engineering, and international operations of a global satellite communications provider and, closer to her heart, creating a local fundraising chapter of an international literacy organization. Polly's track record managing and growing organizations responsibly and transparently dovetails with her humanitarian worldview. She is committed to making wise use of the Foundation's resources, enabling it to extend its reach while staying true to its mission. Polly is passionate about helping people with Parkinson's thrive by providing education and connection to the community and funding quality of life research that takes the guesswork out of living well.



CYNTHIA FOX, PHD

Dr. Fox received her doctorate in speech and hearing sciences from the University of Arizona, Tucson. She is an expert on rehabilitation and neuroplasticity and exercise's role in improving function consequent to neural injury and disease. Dr. Fox began working with Dr. Ramig over 20 years ago, conducting efficacy research on LSVT in people with Parkinson's, and was the first to apply this treatment to disorders other than Parkinson's (e.g., multiple sclerosis). Dr. Fox serves as faculty for LSVT LOUD and LSVT BIG training and certification courses. In addition, she has numerous publications in these areas of research and has presented extensively nationally and internationally. Dr. Fox was recently appointed CEO of LSVT Global.



DAVID LEVENTHAL

David Leventhal is a founding teacher and Program Director for Dance for PD®, a program of the Mark Morris Dance Group that has now been used as a model for classes in more than 300 communities in 25 countries. He leads classes for people with Parkinson's around the world and trains other teachers in the Dance for PD® approach. He has co-produced five volumes of a successful At Home DVD series for the program and has been instrumental in initiating and designing innovative projects involving live streaming and Moving Through Glass, a dancebased Google Glass App for people with Parkinson's. He received the 2016 World Parkinson Congress Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Parkinson's Community and was a co-recipient of the 2013 Alan Bonander Humanitarian Award from the Parkinson's Unity Walk. He graduated from Brown University with honors in English Literature.



STACEY MACALUSO

Stacey Macaluso has worked with the Parkinson's community for over ten years. She led the Parkinson's Connection at the Katz JCC in Cherry Hill, NJ, from 2017-2022 and developed the program to be one of the most extensive programs on the east coast for people with Parkinson's. As coordinator and coach, Stacey has received many awards for her work, including being a nominee for the Rock Steady Boxing Coach of the Year award in 2020. Stacey is the founder of Mission PD, where she is a life coach and fitness specialist virtually for people all over the world, teaching Rock Steady Boxing, Pedaling for Parkinson's, PWR Moves!, and Dance for PD. She has also practiced as a dental hygienist in the South Jersey community for three decades. Stacey lives in New Jersey with her husband Michael of 30 years, where they raised their children Adrienne, Michael, and Abigail.



KRISTIN MELDRUM

Kris Meldrum is President of Parkinson's Place Iowa and an Ambassador for the Davis Phinney Foundation for Parkinson's. As a Parkinson's Wellness Coach, she has more than 15 years of experience in the fitness industry and worked for a decade in the medical fitness industry before starting Genesis Health Club's Neuro Wellness Program in 2020. Kris's writing has appeared on the Davis Phinney Foundation for Parkinson's website, Rock Steady Boxing In Your Corner National Magazine, and The American Parkinson's Association's (APDA) IA Chapter LiveIt magazine. Kris is an American Council on Exercise (ACE) Senior Fitness Specialist; an ACE Certified Group Fitness Instructor; an ACE Approved Parkinson's Cycle Coach; a Certified Mad Dogg SPINNING® Advanced Instructor; a Mad Dogg SpinPOWER® Instructor; a Certified Rock Steady Boxing Parkinson's Head Coach; a Certified Ohio Health Parkinson's Delay the Disease™ Instructor; an SCW Certified Aguatic Instructor, and has completed the APDA Parkinson's Training for Fitness Professionals. Kris also speaks nationally at Parkinson's Conferences about "How to Exercise to Improve Parkinson's Symptoms—The Science Behind Parkinson's Exercise."



BRETT MILLER

Brett is the founder and owner of 110 Fitness in Rockland. Massachusetts, an all-inclusive wellness center that's the largest in the world for individuals with Parkinson's. Brett is passionate about adaptive fitness and inspiring the best in everyone he meets. His wellness design aims to set a new standard for people with Parkinson's through holistic and fitness-based approaches. Brett is a licensed physical therapist with 27 years of experience in sports therapy, acute and intensive care, long-term care, and wound care settings. Brett is certified in Concept 2 Rowing, PWR!Moves®, Pedaling for Parkinson's, SCW Boxing Fitness, SCW Aquatics Exercise, and Tai Ji Quan: Moving for Better Balance. Brett is also a US Army veteran and is proud to have served as a combat medic trainer for special operations and oversaw the construction and development of the DEPMEDS for the United States Army. He recently published, It's A Beautiful Day to Save Lives: A Medic's Journey to His Destiny. Brett serves as the Massachusetts Parkinson's Registry co-chair and a Massachusetts State Athletic Commission Commissioner. He has also been a long-time Ambassador for the Davis Phinney Foundation.



TOM PALIZZI

Tom Palizzi is actively engaged in the global Parkinson's community, serving on the board of directors for a national Parkinson's foundation and patient advisory council while always remaining involved with public policy and disease legislation. Locally, he leads Pedaling for Parkinson's indoor cycling classes three days a week, and you can also catch him speaking to support groups. He believes being active and engaged are vital to living well with Parkinson's. As an Ambassador for the Davis Phinney Foundation, he hopes to help others understand how they can live well too.



DAVIS PHINNEY

Davis Phinney was fresh off a successful professional cycling career, where he won an Olympic bronze medal in 1984 and was part of the first American team to race in the Tour de France, when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's. He founded the Davis Phinney Foundation in 2004 with the goal of helping people living with Parkinson's to improve their quality of life through education, inspiration, resources, and effective self-care. Davis' perseverance, coupled with his infectious positive attitude and dedication, inspires the work of the Davis Phinney Foundation and has earned him the reputation as a tireless advocate and mentor for others living with Parkinson's. In spring 2015, he was honored at the White House as a Champion of Change because of his work in the Parkinson's community.



INDU SUBRAMANIAN, MD

Dr. Subramanian received her medical degree from the University of Toronto, Canada, and did her neurology residency and movement disorders fellowship training at UCLA. Dr. Subramanian is now a Clinical Professor of Neurology. She established the movement disorder clinic at the West Los Angeles Veterans Administration and has assumed the position of the Director of the Southwest PADRECC (Parkinson Disease Research, Education, and Clinical Care) Center of Excellence in Parkinson's. Dr. Subramanian has a deep interest in integrative medicine, particularly in Yoga and Mindfulness. She underwent a 200-hour yoga teacher training and studied mindfulness at the VA with J.G. Serpa and Christian Wolfe through Insight LA. In addition, she is currently designing a yoga teacher training program for yoga instructors interested in working with people with Parkinson's. Dr. Subramanian recently got board certified in Integrative medicine. She is also passionate about palliative care in Parkinson's, is doing a contemplative fellowship for health care providers through the New York Zen Center, and is an AAN Palitucci Fellow.

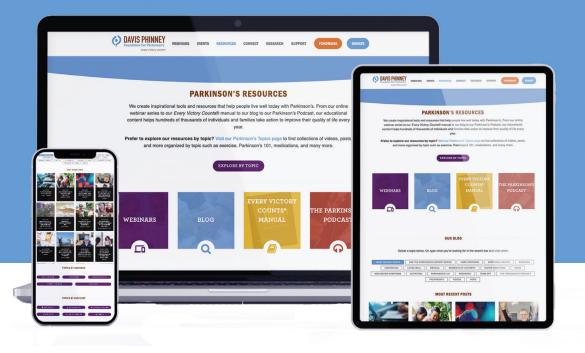

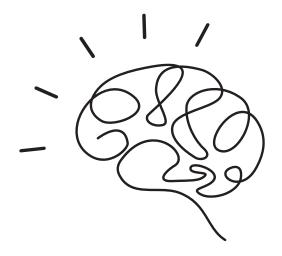

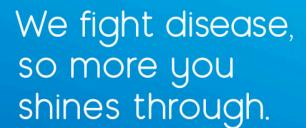

Just a decade ago, researchers, clinicians, and people living with Parkinson's did not stress the importance of exercise, stress management, diet, and other positive life choices on Parkinson's. Today, we know that your experience can be affected in a positive way by your choices and actions. Here are some you can take right now to start living well with Parkinson's:

- » **Listen.** Pay attention to your body and report any changes to your healthcare team. Listen also to family and friends who may see changes in you.
- » Think holistically. Holistic health means that you look at your whole self and take an integrated approach to care. Every part of you is connected to and influenced by the other parts of you; so, it is important to address Parkinson's through lifestyle, diet, exercise, stress management, relationships, and personal and spiritual care and growth.
- » Be informed. Learn how personal and lifestyle habits can affect your symptoms. The more you know about Parkinson's, the more empowered you'll feel to form useful habits to combat your symptoms. For instance, physical activity is critical at all stages of Parkinson's. However, a regular exercise program will take time and energy from other aspects of your life. Knowing which activities to keep or eliminate will maximize the positive impact of the choices you can control.

- » Be prepared. Organize your healthcare documents and other important information, so you always have it on hand. Prepare for your medical appointments to get the best results from your time with the doctor.
- » Be your own best advocate. Ask for a referral to a rehabilitation therapist if you haven't received one. Talk with your healthcare team about your goals and concerns. Make them aware of areas you want to improve. For instance, if using a keyboard has become difficult, ask your doctor about strategies to improve hand function. If you seek treatment early and are specific about symptoms or problems that make everyday life frustrating, you'll help your doctor tailor the most effective treatment plan.
- » Stay Connected. Seek support from people with whom you feel comfortable sharing your thoughts and concerns. Your support system may include people you trust, such as specific family members, friends, or individuals from church or work. Support groups can be helpful, as are group exercise classes and gathering with small groups of other people living with Parkinson's who encourage and inspire you.
 - change. This may mean taking medicines on time to limit symptoms or beginning rehabilitative therapy to improve your posture or the volume of your voice. It will mean starting or renewing your commitment to daily exercise and may also include changing your lifestyle to promote overall health by losing weight, stopping smoking, and eating a healthy diet.

LIVE WELL TODAY

- » Learn to live with the symptoms you can't change. Although a combination of medications, complementary therapies, and lifestyle changes will help you manage Parkinson's symptoms, symptoms will still show up in different ways in your life. Start to learn different ways to live with the reality of symptoms as you manage them or ways to manage those symptoms that may be less responsive to therapies. For instance, if a bothersome tremor doesn't always respond to medications, try reducing the anxiety that can make them worse. Practice deep breathing relaxation techniques and intentionally reduce stress as other ways to help manage tremor.
- » Learn about clinical research trials. Many researchers look to understand the impact of medicines in the early stages before any other medicine has been started, and they are always looking for participants. Another significant area of research is the study of neuroprotective therapies that can slow or potentially even stop the progression of Parkinson's. While taking part in a research trial is not for everyone, many love playing a role in advancing the science of Parkinson's for the greater community. - Practice gratitude daily. Train yourself to shift your attention to things that bring you joy instead of concerns over which you have no control. Call a friend, write a gratitude letter, perform a random act of kindness, or donate your time to a cause. When you experience things that bring you joy, whether big or small, take the time to savor them and be fully present. By building little moments of gratitude into your daily routine, you will begin to see that your world is filled with things to appreciate.
- » **Stay positive.** A positive attitude keeps the focus on what you can do, not what you can't. It fosters hope. If you're having a bad day, **search for the small victories and celebrate them.**Remember, tomorrow will bring another opportunity to live well.
