On July 23rd, over 40,000 cyclists joined us for Parkinson's Awareness Day honoring Davis Phinney at the Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa (RAGBRAI). This event is the oldest and largest bike touring event in the world.

During the day, cyclists were treated with signage along the route highlighting Davis's career achievements and the work of the Foundation. That evening, Davis led the crowd to a rousing arms-up victory salute after being honored with a proclamation from the governor of Iowa.

This day highlighted a long-time partnership between the Davis Phinney Foundation and Dr. Jay Alberts of Cleveland Clinic. Dr. Alberts discovered the correlation between cycling and and improved symptoms associated with Parkinson's while riding RAGBRAI on a tandem bike with a person with Parkinson's.

In addition to providing early funding for Dr. Alberts's work, we recently funded his study to investigate the effectiveness of Pedaling for Parkinson's, an existing low-cost community cycling class, for reducing motor symptoms for people living with Parkinson's. Results of this study will be published in 2020. We look forward to sharing them with you.



The newest version of the *Every Victory Counts®* manual was released in April and is being distributed across the US and Canada. Updates to this version include new articles on important topics including hallucinations and impulse control disorders as well as new worksheets.
